Trails & Natural Parklands Bean Peaks, a First in Arizona

Located just three miles south of downtown Prescott, at an altitude of 6468 feet in the Prescott National Forest near the White Spark Campground, Bean Peaks is the first large scale gravity flow trail system in Arizona. Gravity flow trails are mountain bike-optimized, one-way trails that are machine-built with berms, jumps, and other fun features. With completion of Phase 1, the descent on this one-way trail is 620 feet. When Phase 3 is completed, the total overall descent will be 850 feet. According to Ximena Florez, Board President of the Prescott Mountain Bike Alliance, "The trail system will offer a safe and exciting rollercoaster-like experience that can be enjoyed by mountain bikers of many different levels and ages." The trails are designed to include adaptive bikes - for instance, recumbent hand-pedaled bikes - making these trails accessible to riders with special needs.

Prescott is the home to hundreds of miles of trails that connect the city to the surrounding Prescott National Forest. The

trails, coupled with an active and engaged community, have helped grow the popularity of mountain biking among riders of all ages in the area as well as a destination for visitors.

Bean Peaks Gravity Flow Trail System will eventually cover an estimate 17 miles of new trail in the forest. The first portion consisting of 9.2 miles of trail had its Grand Opening and Ribbon Cutting on May 31, 2024. Described as a downhill-optimized trail, it offers mountain bikers a rollercoaster like ride on a bike and is a first of its kind in Arizona. Bean Peaks Gravity Flow Trail System Partnerships & The Community Made It Happen

After years of planning, public comment periods, and collaboration, the Bean peaks Gravity Flow Trail System received final approval from the U.S. Forest Service in July 2023. The project is a joint initiative of the Prescott National Forest Service, the Prescott Mountain Bike Alliance (PMBA), the City of Prescott, and the International Mountain Bicycling Association (IMBA).

Half of the \$25,000.00 required for the initial planning of the project was raised by PMBA, and were matched by IMBA. The first phase (completed in May 2024) was budgeted at \$350,000.00 PMBA raised these funds through community outreach efforts and events. PMBA's fund raising efforts are ongoing to complete the final two phases of the project. Additional funds have also been receive through grants from Arizona State Parks.

The City of Prescott Recreation Services Department constructed the trails with the assistance of Over The

Hill Gang volunteers. PMBA and their volunteers will be coordinating annual maintenance of the trails.
